John Wyeth's Repository of Sacred Music, Part Second (1813)

Hymns: UMH 198, 226, 400, 518, 726 Tunes: NETTLETON (400) by an unknown composer, DAVIS by Freeman Lewis (518), MORNING SONG attributed to Elkanah Kelsav Dare (198, 226, 726) Texts: Miriam T. Winter (198), Luke 2:29-32 (226), Robert Robinson (400), Joseph Swain (518), Walter R. Bowie (726) Each was first published in John Wyeth's Repository of Sacred Music, Part Second (1813).

Rather than focus on a single hymn or hymn tune, this month I want to showcase a hymnal. The compilation and publication of which marked the beginning of a "Golden Age" of hymn writing and singing in the South. Due to space considerations in the newsletter, I have omitted the UMH titles. Three hymn tunes from this compilation are in our hymnal. MORNING SONG is a peculiar little tune in a minor key giving it a melancholy character. In our hymnal, it is set to three different texts. Of the three texts, we have sung two of them since I took over as music director, most recently on May 10 (UMH 198). The tune called DAVIS (also known as MEDITATION) is not familiar to me. We may feature it as an anthem some time when appropriate (UMH 518). The tune NETTLETON is no stranger to us. You know it by the title "Come, Thou Fount of Every Blessing" (UMH 400) with the text written by Robert Robinson. It is the most popular hymn in the UMH to come from John Wyeth's hymnal. Also, the most popular hymn tune to come from this collection was written by an unknown composer. The other composers, Freeman Lewis and Elkanah Dare (who was also the editor of Wyeth's hymnal), are not cited in the UMH. All the composers were New Englanders, as was publisher John Wyeth. John Wyeth, a printer and bookseller, had a limited music education. He knew what he liked, knew what others liked, and had a plethora of sources for his hymnals. Part Second refers to this hymnal being the second of a two-part series. Obviously, he relied on his chosen editor in musical matters, composer Elkanah Kelsay Dare, who contributed more than a dozen tunes himself. John Wyeth was a lover of church music but also a keen businessman. To maximize his profits, he intended to print a hymnal that any denomination could use. Many tunes from Wyeth's hymnal would later be included in hymnals that would develop out of the southern singing schools, such as Kentucky Harmony (1816), Southern Harmony (1835), and the most famous Sacred Harp (1844). These hymnals used shape-note musical notation. These hymns persist in church music today. You can even purchase a reprint of the original Repository. These hymns are included in hymnals of many denominations, which is what John Wyeth intended.

OPERATION CHRISTMAS CHILD "...go and make disciples of all nations..."



Although we are a month later than usual in kicking off our church-wide Operation Christmas Child Campaign, we have ample time to fill and pack our 100+ shoeboxes. Last year DeRidder area churches donated 3,653 boxes, 225 more than 2018; and SWLA churches packed 24,816 boxes. In the years 2017 and 2018, 1,286 churches were born as a direct result of this global mission. These shoeboxes were the actual foundation on which Jesus' church came into existence in third-world countries. In the past 10 years, 18.9 million children enrolled in the discipleship program that accompanies the shoeboxes. Of that number, 8.9 million participants accepted Christ.

Our plan follows that of past years as we collect items throughout the summer for children between 5 and 9 years of age with a specific category each month. Until the sanctuary is open for Sunday worship, items can be kept at home of dropped at the office beginning June 10. Please make sure items are of a size that can be packed easily into the shoebox. If individuals (or classes/groups) would like to pack their own boxes, that would be great! Monthly categories are: JUNE (Toys), JULY (School Supplies/Crafts), AUG (Clothing/Accessories), SEPT (Hygiene Items), OCT (Donations for Shipping and Teacher Training Costs).


